This report is a proposed 12-month thematic plan that is designed to enhance Uganda's economic and governance systems while minimizing or eliminating any and all identified sanctions. The document focuses on two specific needs - IMMEDIATE NEEDS and LONG TERM NEEDS (SUGGESTED MONTHLY THEMES). They are tailored to address key areas of development while aligning with easing sanctions and promoting international collaboration:

- August Education and Workforce Development: Aligning educational reforms with the academic calendar to equip the next generation with skills for emerging industries.

MONTHLY THEMES FOR A FIVE-YEAR PLAN - SPECIFICS

JANUARY - GOVERNANCE AND RULE OF LAW

- Focus: Begin the year with foundational reforms to strengthen democratic governance and the rule of law.
- Key Topics: Anti-corruption measures, legal system reforms, and accountability for public officials.

Year 1A: 72 Hour Committee Agenda Notice and Records Digitalization

- Summary: Establishing a 72 hour agenda notice for all committee hearings and official operations will provide transparency. This compliments governmental actions that establish a centralized digital system for managing public records, enhancing transparency and accessibility.
- Analysis: Improves accountability and reduces corruption. Builds public trust.
- Budget:
 - Notice: \$250,000 initial investment with a projected yearly expense of \$100,000
 - Digitalization: \$10 million initial investment; projected \$5 million saved annually through efficiency.

Year 1B - Lobbying Program

- Summary: Establish an international Lobbying program designed to operate in selected nations with respect to foreign aid.
- Analysis: Will enhance relationships with nations and educate about Uganda and where their money goes. This will help open the nation (and presidency) while providing transparency, public education and citizen involvement.
- Budget: \$500,000 million with an operating expense of \$5 million a year once implemented

Year 1C - Computerize the Parliament Project

- Summary: After bidding process is complete (first year), we will update the Parliament and their website operations in an effort to computerize and support automation of general activities in an effort to enhance transparency, educate the nation and solicit public involvement.
- Analysis: Will enhance transparency, involvement and public education
- Budget: \$62 million with an operating expense of \$5 million a year once implemented

Year 2: Anti-Corruption Task Force

- Summary: Form a specialized team to investigate and prosecute corruption cases.
- Analysis: Restores faith in government while recovering misappropriated funds.
- Budget: \$3 million annually; potential recovery of \$10 million/year.

Year 3: Judicial Training Programs

- Summary: Train judges and lawyers to improve case efficiency and understanding of human rights laws.
- Analysis: Reduces backlog of cases and ensures fairer trials.
- Budget: \$2 million annually.

Year 4: Community Legal Clinics

- Summary: Establish free legal advisory services in rural areas.
- Analysis: Empowers citizens and reduces legal inequalities.

• Budget: \$5 million annually.

Year 5: National Referendum on Constitution Updates

- Summary: Revise outdated laws and systems through participatory democracy.
- Analysis: Aligns laws with modern needs, reducing ambiguity.

FEBRUARY - ELECTORAL REFORMS

- Summary: Evaluate and restructure the commission for greater independence.
- Analysis: Enhances public confidence in elections.
- Budget: \$1.5 million.

Year 2: Voter Education Campaign

- Summary: Nationwide programs to educate citizens on voting rights and processes.
- Analysis: Improves voter turnout and reduces fraud.
- Budget: \$3 million.

Year 3: Digital Voting Pilots

- Summary: Test secure electronic voting systems in urban centers.
